To help readers connect with the person, artifacts with links to additional information are arranged in a table. Sources of information are cited using a bibliography. Upon completion, the biography is shared with readers. Extension activities challenge students to customize page layout, connect information with bookmarks, or create awards of distinction.

TechnoBiography Overview

In this course, students become biographers writing about a person's life story using Word 365. To start, they research a notable figure who has made a difference in the world. Once familiar with events and achievements, students summarize a personal history using heading styles to organize events logically. Contributions are highlighted using a graphic organizer. To help readers connect with the person, artifacts with links to additional information are arranged in a table. Sources of information are cited using a bibliography. Upon completion, the biography is shared with readers. Extension activities challenge students to customize page layout, connect information with bookmarks, or create awards of distinction.



Students complete the following tasks:

- ➤ In Session 1, students become biographers. They prepare to write about the life story of a remarkable person. To start, they view a sample biography about a famous astronaut to understand how a person's history and achievements can be summarized. Next, they brainstorm a topic for their own publication. It could be about an inventor, explorer, athlete, or artist. There are so many possibilities!
- ➤ In Session 2, students research a significant person's history and accomplishments. The biography should highlight early experiences that influence the person's future, the importance of their achievements, and events that demonstrate their personality. Using tertiary, secondary, and primary sources of information students prepare to write a life story.
- In Session 3, students begin to write the biography. They gain valuable word processing skills as they create a title page. Next, they build the document structure using heading styles. There will be sections for personal history, contributions, media gallery, and a bibliography. Once the framework for the publication is complete, they use the heading styles to make a table of contents, which will allow the reader to quickly find relevant information.
- ➤ In Session 4, students start to write the biography. They rephrase their researched information to summarize details about the person's early life, family, education, and career. Transition words are provided to help students connect ideas. Next, they create a SmartArt graphic that highlights accomplishments. To engage readers, an optional activity explains how to design a "bumper sticker" with an inspirational message associated with the person.
- ➤ In Session 5, students design a Media Gallery. It will include artifacts of objects from a person's life, such as a video of a performance, link to a speech, or image of a birth certificate. This will help readers form a connection to the person. A table is used to organize the information. Upon completion, students make a bibliography that summarizes their list of sources. To add interest, an optional activity explains how to bookmark a location in a document to connect information in the Personal History section to an artifact in the Media Gallery.
- ➤ In Session 6, students share their biography with readers. They select an option for publishing. It could be printed or digital. Prior to publication, an extension activity explains how to customize page layout. Students can adjust the page margins, add headers and footers, and modify line spacing. If time permits, discuss the contributions of the significant person with others. Why are they a source of inspiration?

TechnoBiography Course Outline

Purpose: Write a biography about a person that has made a difference in the world.

Summary of Activities:

- Understand the role of a biographer. Study sample biographies.
- Brainstorm a topic for a biography. Select a notable person.
- Research basic facts using an encyclopedia. Record information using an organizer.
- Continue to research using secondary sources to gain a deeper understanding of the person's life.
- Collect artifacts directly connected to the person. Analyze the primary sources to draw conclusions.
- Complete a research checklist to confirm readiness to write a biography.
- Create a title page for the biography.
- Set document structure by adding heading styles and inserting a table of contents.
- Write a personal history. Summarize the person's early life, family, education, and career.
- Make a graphic organizer of accomplishments. Explain their importance.
- Design a media gallery of artifacts using a table. Describe their connection to the person.
- Cite sources of information in a bibliography.
- Complete a biography checklist. Edit the document based on the assessment.
- Share biography with readers as an eBook. Use questions to make a connection to the reader.

Extension Activities:

- Create a School Award: Design a certificate of recognition named after the person.
- Make a Bumper Sticker: Use drawing tools to make a saying or quote based on the person's life.
- Insert a Video: Insert a video clip into the Media Gallery.
- Link Artifacts Using Bookmarks: Insert a link that connects to a bookmarked artifact.
- Customize Page Layout: Adjust margins, insert headers/footers, or set line and paragraph spacing.

Notes:

- It is recommended students have background knowledge about a historical period or social context related to the person being studied.
- Although samples are provided, it is beneficial for students to read biographies or watch documentaries to gain familiarity with the biography genre.
- The more current the person, the more digital content available on the Internet.

Technology Integration Ideas

In TechnoBiography, students become biographers. They write a biography about a notable person using Microsoft Word. The activities integrate into curriculum and can be included into language arts, history, social studies, science, art, or computer studies.

- Write a Life Story: Practice expository writing. Write an engaging life story that offers insight into a person. Captivate the reader's attention.
- Celebrate a Historical Figure: Develop a deeper understanding of a historical period.
 Research the contributions of a historical figure. Explain their importance to the past and influence on future events.
- Acknowledge a Hero: Inspire others with the accomplishments of personal hero, role model, mentor, or newsmaker. Detail their successes and challenges. Outline reasons their efforts are admirable.
- Investigate Scientific Contributions: Appreciate amazing research findings and inventions.
 Outline the path to discovery of a scientist. Explain how their work has improved the lives of others.
- Appreciate the Arts: Learn about an art period or artistic style by studying a famous artist.
 Examine their artwork. Describe its meaning and how it influenced other artists.
- Develop Word Processing Skills: Introduce word processing skills in a computer studies course. Learn to customize styles, insert a table of contents, draw a graphic organizer, organize data using tables, adjust page layout, and add bookmarks.

Understanding the Big Picture

Assignment 1 What is a Biography?

You are going to become a biographer. A biographer is someone that writes about the life story or *biography* of a remarkable person. You will share your biography with readers.



What is a Biography?

A biography is a description of someone's life written by another person. It provides a summary of their personal history, explains the importance of their contributions, and offers insight into their personality. Often a biography will include photographs, video clips, or personal documents.

Assignment 5 Research using Primary Sources

You cannot rely solely on tertiary or secondary sources of information when writing a biography. You need to draw your own conclusions about a person. The best way to do this is to study raw data.

Biographical research requires a biographer to collect and analyze artifacts from a person's life.

The artifacts are primary sources of information. They are valuable because they offer first hand evidence of a life event. Primary sources help biographers to gain an understanding about a person's actions, ideas, beliefs, or emotions.

Types of Primary Sources

A primary source of information is an original artifact that has a direct connection to the person.

Primary Source Tips:

- ✓ Timing Matters: A primary source is created at the time of the event or shortly thereafter.
- ✓ No Judgement: A primary source is raw data and has not been interpreted by someone else.
- ✓ Verify Authenticity: Check the source of the artifact. It should be posted by a reliable source such as a museum, reputable organization, or official fan club.
- ✓ Copy of Original: A primary source is often one-of-a-kind or rare. Since there is a limited number, the artifact can be the actual item, digital copy, or exact replica.

Collect Artifacts



Use the Internet to collect three primary sources. Try to find a variety. Where possible, save a picture of the artifact to include in your biography. If it is a video, save the URL.

- Open your Organizer in Word.
- > Record information about each artifact.

Item Name	Importance	URL (picture of artifact, news story about item, video of artifact in use)

Interpret Importance: Study the artifact. Ask yourself questions to discover its importance.

- Why did you pick this artifact? Why did it attract your attention?
- What do you notice about the artifact? What makes it interesting?
- Why do you think the artifact was created? Who is the audience?
- What does the artifact tell you about the person's personality?
- What feelings or ideas do you think are being expressed?
- What does the artifact tell you about the time period, or society?
- Did the artifact influence future events?

In this assignment, you set the document structure using heading styles. Heading styles identify the type of information. They clearly show the reader the difference between main headings and subheadings.


Open the Biography in Word

Insert a Page Break



Your biography will have an interactive table of contents that takes readers directly to information in the biography. To start, you need to make a new page. To do this, you must insert a page break. A page break can be used to add a blank page or divide content onto separate pages.

- ▶ Place the cursor at the END of the front cover. or press CTRL+END to move the cursor to the end of the document.
- ▶ From the Insert tab, click Page Break. ☐




Type Table of Contents Title on the New Page

○ On the new page, type Table of Contents. Press ENTER twice.

Add Document Headings

- Use your skills to insert a new page. —
 On the new page add the biography headings. Press ENTER twice after each heading:
 - Personal History

 - o Career
 - Contributions
 - o Media Gallery
 - o Bibliography



Apply Heading Styles



A heading style is a pre-set formatting option applied to text. You will use heading styles to organize information in the biography, create a consistent design, and automatically generate a table of contents.

- > Select the heading Personal History.
- Click the Home tab and locate the Styles group. Select Heading 1. ☐



Heading 1 is a main heading. Heading 2 is a subheading.



Select each heading <u>separately</u> so that the Heading Style is not applied to the spaces in between. This is where the facts will be written. They should be normal style.

Customize Heading Styles

- > Select the heading Personal History.
- \triangleright Format the font Galibri (Body), size 11, style $\mathbf{B} \mathbf{I} \mathbf{U}$, color \mathbf{A} , effect \mathbf{A} , and alignment $\mathbf{\Xi}$.
- ▶ Right click Heading 1 in the Styles group of the Home tab. Select Update Heading 1 to Match Selection.







▶ Use your skills to customize the Heading 2 style.

Insert Table of Contents

- > Select the Table of Contents title.
- Click the References tab.
- Click Table of Contents. Select Automatic Table 1.



- ▶ Look at the Table of Contents. Hold the CTRL key and click on a heading.
- The cursor moves to that heading in the biography.



- ▶ If you edit or add new headings, to update the Table of Contents:
 - o Right click on the Table of Contents and choose Update Field. $\Box !$
 - o Choose Update entire table.
 - o Click OK.

Save the Biography and Exit Word



Open Biography in Word


Insert a Page Break (Optional)

- ▶ If you do not have much room left on the Personal History page, place the cursor <u>before</u> the heading Contributions.
- > From the Insert tab, click Page Break.




Insert a SmartArt Graphic

- Place the cursor <u>below</u> the Contributions heading.
- Click the Insert tab.
- Click SmartArt. Pick a graphic. Click OK.
- The SmartArt appears.



Describe the Importance of Accomplishments

- ▶ If you cannot see the text pane, enable it by clicking Text Pane in the Create Graphic group on the SmartArt Design tab.
- ▶ Add the first item into the Text pane:
 - o Beside the first bullet, type the Accomplishment Name.
 - Press Add Bullet = on the SmartArt Design tab.
 Provide details readers would find interesting. Press ENTER.
 - o Explain the importance at the time or afterwards. Press enter.
- Use your skills to add more accomplishments.



Format the SmartArt Graphic

- ▷ Select the SmartArt.
- From the SmartArt Design tab, click the More arrow in the Layouts group. Select an option.



- ▶ In the SmartArt Styles group, click Change Colors ③. Pick an option.
- ▷ Click the More arrow in the SmartArt Styles group. Pick an option.



▶ Resize the SmartArt to fill the page. SmartArt to fill the page.

Add Pictures to the Graphic Organizer (Optional)

There are two ways to add pictures to the graphic organizer.

- Method A is for SmartArt layouts that <u>include</u> a picture placeholder.
- Method B is for SmartArt layouts that are <u>text only</u>.
- ▶ Method A Insert a picture into a SmartArt placeholder:
 - o Click the Insert Pictures placeholder.
 - o From the Insert Pictures dialog box, pick Online Pictures.
 - o In the search box, type name of person or object. Press ENTER.
 - o Click on a picture you like. Click Insert.



DESIGN TIP

If the picture does not fit the placeholder frame, try the following:

- 1. Click the Crop 4 menu on the Picture Format tab.
- 2. Select an option:
 - Choose Fill to resize the picture so the entire picture area is filled. This keeps the original aspect ratio. Any area of the picture that falls outside of the picture area will be cropped.
 - Choose Fit to resize the picture so the entire picture displays inside the picture area. This keeps the original aspect ratio without cropping.
- ▶ Method B Insert a picture on the same page as the SmartArt:
 - o Click outside the SmartArt to make sure it is not selected.
 - o From the Insert tab, click Insert Pictures.

 Choose Online Pictures.

 Use your skills to search for and insert a picture.
 - Select the picture.
 Click Layout Options and pick In Front of Text.
 - o Resize [™] and place [†] the picture on the page near the SmartArt graphic.



Save the Biography and Exit Word

Make your biography look even better! Open the file and follow the instructions to alter the page layout.

- 1. Open the biography in Microsoft Word.
- 2. Adjust the page margins:
 - a. Click the Layout tab. Click Margins.
 - b. Select an option.



Choose *Wide* if you do not have much text or *Narrow* if you want to fit more on a page.

- c. Preview the document and make any necessary changes.
 Note: The SmartArt graphic organizer and some images may not adjust to the margin changes.
- 3. Insert a custom header:
 - a. Place the cursor on the title page.
 - b. Click the Insert tab. Click Header . Choose Edit Header.




c. From the Options group of the Header & Footer tab, click Different First Page.



- d. Click Next to move to the header on the next page.
- e. Add information to the header section:
 - Type Name of Person. Press TAB.
 - Type Biography. Press TAB.
 - Type By Student Name.
- 4. Insert a custom footer:
 - a. From the Header & Footer tab, click Go to Footer \Box .
 - b. In the footer section, use your skills to add information such as Class, Subject, Date, or Teacher Name.

- 5. Insert a page number in the margins:
 - a. From the Header & Footer tab, click Page Number.
 - b. Select Page Margins.
 - c. Pick an option from the gallery.



- d. From the Header & Footer tab, click Close Header and Footer.
- 6. Change the line spacing of text:
 - a. Select the text you want to edit. For example, select text in the Media Gallery table.
 - b. From the Home tab, click Line and Paragraph Spacing.



- 7. Change paragraph spacing of headings:
 - a. Select a heading.
 - b. Click the Layout tab. Type a value in the Before and After Spacing boxes.



- c. Click on the Home tab. Right click on the styles heading.
- d. Select Update Heading to Match Selection to make all heading styles look the same.



8. Save the biography and exit Microsoft Word.

The Amazing Life John H. Glenn Military Leader, Pilot, Astronaut, U.S. Senator




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Personal History

John Glenn was a famous military leader, pilot, astronaut, and senator. He was born July 18th, 1921 in Ohio. He died on December 8th, 2016. His fearless nature was an inspiration to others.

Early Life and Family

John grew up in New Concord, a small town in Ohio. As a young boy, he had an interest in science and flight. In 1943, he married Anna, his childhood friend. They were married for over seventy years, had two children, and grandchildren.



Education

John attended primary and secondary schools in New Concord. Afterwards, he went to Muskingum College to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering. In 1942, John joined the US Naval Aviation Cadet Program where he began to develop his superior piloting skills. Many years later he continued his flight training and graduated from the US Naval Test Pilot School.

Career
Military Leader and Pilot



John's military career began in 1943 when he joined the US Marine Corp. He flew 59 combat missions in World War II and later flew missions in the Korean war. In 1948, his passion for flying led him to join the Naval Air Test Center, where he served as a test pilot for Naval and Marine aircraft. He retired from the Marine Corps in 1965 as the rank of Colonel.

NASA Astronaut

In 1959, John was looking for a new adventure. He joined NASA as a Project Mercury Astronaut. Only a few short years later, he would be the first American to orbit Earth in the Friendship 7 spacecraft. He served as an advisor to NASA until 1964, when he left to pursue public office. However, his love of space exploration continued throughout his life and 36 years after his flight into space he returned to NASA in 1998 to be the payload specialist on the Discovery space shuttle. He was 77 years old!



Senator



In 1964, John wanted to become a senator. Unfortunately, his plans were derailed when he had an accident. He spent several years working as a business executive. In 1970, he ran again for senate but lost. He did not give up and in 1974 he was elected to the US Senate. Senator Glenn served four terms. He liked politics and even ran for president, although he did not win. John retired from politics in 1999.

War Hero

- John Glenn flew missions in World War II and the Korean war. In the last nine days of fighting in Korea, Glenn downed three MiGs in combat along the Yalu River. He has been awarded many valor medals.
- His military service helped to protect the US and their allies.



Space Explorer

• John Glenn was the first American to orbit Earth. His flight lasted 4 hours, 55 minutes, and 23 seconds. He is the oldest person to travel into space as part of the NASA STS-95 mission. His contributions to NASA provided the foundation for future engineering of spacecraft



Speed Record Setter

- John Glenn flew at a record speed of 725.55 mph from LA to NY in 3 hours, 23 minutes, and 8.4 seconds. It was the first transcontinental flight to average supersonic speed.
- •The purpose of the Project Bullet flight was to test engine requirements for fighter jets. This helped engineers build better planes for combat missions.


